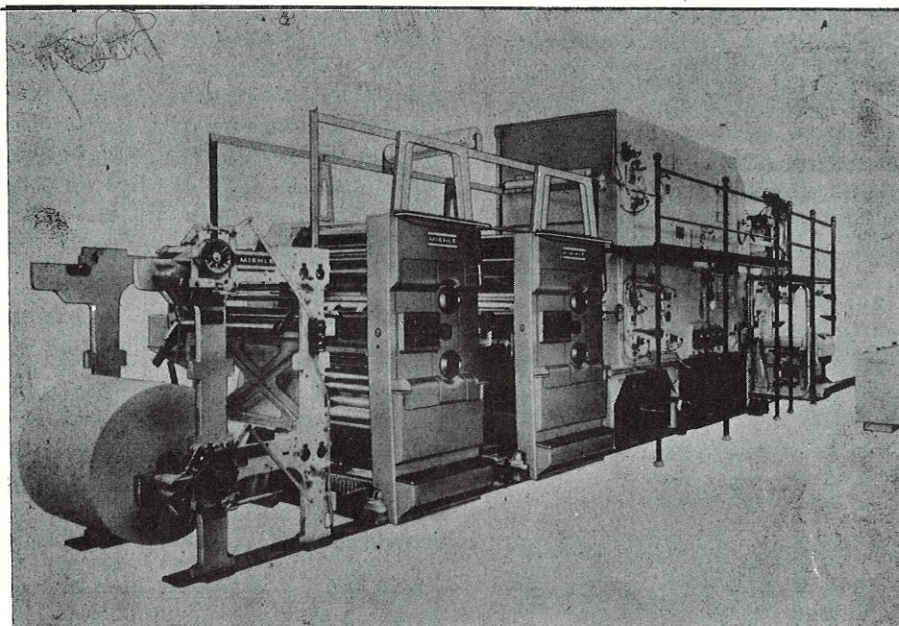

AMBASSADOR TO BUY WEB PRESS

Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong has just given final approval for the purchase of a giant web-fed press to be used for the printing of The PLAIN TRUTH by our own Ambassador College Press!

The acquisition of this new equipment will more than double the present Printing Department capacity. One of the main considerations involved in the decision to buy this press was the COMPLETE CONTROL it will give us over the entire process involved in the printing of The PLAIN TRUTH. No person other than our own employees will even see the product from the time it is written until it is a finished magazine being sent thru the mails to the subscribers.

Ambassador College Press will soon occupy the building which formerly housed the Crown City Lumber Company. The facilities and general lay-out of the building are designed very well to accommodate a printing plant. From the extensive sprinkler system to the adjacent rail spur, this building seems in every way to have been designed for
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A press very similar to this is now being ordered.

Later, a sing along, a piano special by Danny Creed, a vocal solo, a vocal duet, and a recited poem by Robert Niekamp added even more spice to the evening's entertainment. SURPRISE!! This memorable evening was concluded with dancing 'til midnight.

On the evening of November 2nd after Sabbath services at the Harrisburg Church, a wonderful thing happened to me.

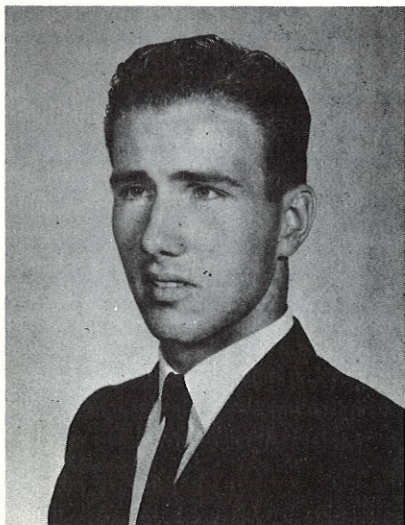

of nine thousand new subscribers per month, one year from now, the mailing list will number about 508,000 persons.

For every person who receives The PLAIN TRUTH, four others read it also. How many then are reading The PLAIN TRUTH right now—every month? The total is an amazing two million persons!

Figuring at the growth rate of thirty per cent a year, what will The PLAIN TRUTH list total in three or eight, or ten years from now? Here is an approximate glimpse. In three years there would be 791,000, in eight years 3,000,000; and in ten years there would be the staggering total of 5,000,000 directly on the mailing list. With four persons reading each issue, ten years from now 20,000,000 people would be reading The PLAIN TRUTH!
