Didn't you, when you first started hearing the truth of God as revealed over "The World Tomorrow", hold your ear to the radio speaker just to get a few sentences before the signal faded out? Has that love and desire to learn God's Truth waned?

lack of respect! A lack of respect for the right of a man to go on living to a full cycle of life — a full threescore and ten years. What a lack of respect for the law and order of the greatest country ever to appear on the face of the earth! What a terrible abuse of the privilege to privately own and properly use a firearm and to freely come and go in a nation of "responsible" people. But more than all this, what an open defiance of the sixth Commandment of God — You shall do no murder!

There are bound to be many repercussions to this act. There will be a change in the world affairs of almost all nations. A new man must be tried and tested in the most demanding position in this world's system. His ideas and desires will emerge as new policy for the U.S. There will be internal changes in this country, as indeed, there already are. We need to pray to God for mercy, guidance of our new leader, continued prosperity, protection from foreign powers all too willing to make that hot seat of the presidency a little hotter. There will be more wars and rumors of war. How will this nation bear up under these things, especially under our new leader? It is up to God.

There have been many questions about the criminal act itself, and the following murder of the suspect. People ask, "Why?". "It it a plot?" **"Who** was behind it?"

Most of these answers are dead and buried in a grave in Texas along with the body of Lee Harvey Oswald. We will not know the real entire story—now.

Of more interest is the assessment of the loss of our president. As well as great political repercussions, there was personal tragedy. For it was becoming evident that Mr. Kennedy was not using his high office to further his personal ambitions nor to serve his church. To all, it was becoming apparent that even if you didn't agree with him, you had to admire and respect him. He had a devoted family. He was interested in his fellow man despite his upper class background. He was intelligent and he surrounded himself with what was referred to as a "high-power brain-trust". He didn't often make the same mistake twice. He was dedicated to and happy in his job. His speeches, although at least in part "ghost-written" by Ted Sorenson and other advisors, were great. He had personality and a good sense of humor. But of the highest importance, was the basic desire of the man. Only men of the highest caliber have been able to master this job and make it a vehicle through which to serve. Only men of great understanding have been able to realize that to love and to give of one's self is the greatest power on earth. More and more, the 26th paragraph from his inaugural address is being used to epitomize his life. Even though this man and his family spent 11/2 million dollars on the campaign to get the office, he didn't abuse the presidency, but said, "Ask not what your country can do for you-ask what you can do for your country." And in the next breath, he said, "My fellow Citizens of the world: Ask not what America will do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of man."

It seemed he tried to live this. We will never know what achievements might have been reached if John F. Kennedy had lived. In this way, especially, his career parallels that of Abraham Lincoln. Perhaps one of the greatest losses we all felt was that a still **young** man went unfulfilled to his grave. A man who showed signs of dawning greatness which now we will not see in this life. But, in the future . . .
