2,000 Attend In Hammond Civic Center Evangelist Blackwell Outlines History Of The True Church!

Monday, June 7, 1965 dawned bright and sunny and over 2000 of God's people loaded their families into their automobiles and began the drive to Hammond, Indiana where God had chosen the Hammond Civic Center to be the place where the 1965 Feast of Pentecost was to be held for the Northern Midwest Area.

We had all assumed, because of having only one day services, that we would not have a visiting minister. We were pleasantly surprised when Mr. and Mrs. Richard Plache and their two children arrived in time for the Feast during their transfer from the Greensboro and Richmond area, to God's College at Pasadena, where he will be a teacher. Mr. Plache is a minister of Pastor rank.

Although we had only one day services for the Feast of Pentecost, nearly 1500 appeared on Sabbath June 5th for weekly Sabbath services at Hammond. In the morning a sermonette was given by Mr. Harold Jackson who spoke on "Disciplining Your Children with God's Laws." Mr. Plache gave the sermon on "The Most Dangerous Enemy is Satan" and told us we should be aware of his devices. We should guard against these seven spirits; 1-rebellion, 2-dissatified attitude, 3-proud, 4-critical, or accusing, 5-unforgiving, 6—fearful. 7—discouraged, and that we should protect ourselves by applying the armor as mentioned in Eph. 6. In the afternoon Mr. Manteufel gave a sermonette on "How to be a Great Leader." Mr. Blackwell followed with a sermon on "What True Christian Love Really Is." He told us that love was patient, kind, that it holds no envy. That love is not selfish, (Continued on page 3)

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

PLAY TO WIN

"Let's go all out to win!"

"Such-and-such is the team to beat."

Our number one goal, so it appears, is winning. We're out to prove we are better than the other teams. But Paul said, "Let each esteem other better than themselves. Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others." Do we yet have the "mind of Christ" in our softball and basketball leagues?

If our main goal is to win, are we not playing through strife and vainglory in disobedience to Paul's command? Granted that when two teams play and a score is kept, one team must win but also what we often overlook is that one team must lose. Search your own heart. Aren't you several times happier when your team wins? Don't you go home sort of discouraged and frustrated when your team loses?

Do you place primary emphasis on fellowship, recreation and a sense of joy and accomplishment for all players on both teams or do you desire to see the other team debased? Paul says that in a race only one receives a corruptible prize but he expects Christians to conduct themselves in a manner that all may win. God does not want His people to go home from a ball game frustrated and filled with a desire for vengeance while another group of His people are hooting and hollering about winning. God tells us, "Do not rejoice when your enemy falls." How much less should we rejoice when our brethren lost?

God does expect us to go all out to win against pride, vanity and human nature but He does not expect us to nurture that pride and vanity by proving we are better than our brethren by virture of winning at some mundane sport.

What are the fruits of "winning at all costs?" "Winning" prompts unwarranted criticism of the umpire's or referee's decisions. "Winning" promotes over-aggressive play which often results in injuries, some of them serious. "Winning" will not permit a coach or manager to "jerk" a "good" player who makes a mistake in attitude or is in danger of causing an injury. "Winning" will not permit playing the poorer members on a team for at least one-fourth or one-third of every game. And they are the ones who need the recreation and the experience the most.

God does want us all to win the battle against personal lethargy. He does want us all to improve our "game." But He's not all that concerned about one team winning and several others losing. Why should you be?

If we really want to have Christian fellowship and develop character, let's emphasize personal development and accomplishment and de-emphasize winning. Perfection in character for all IS Number One Goal.



nor provoked easily. The final point was that love thinks no evil.

Meanwhile, Mr. John Bald and Mr. Carn Catherwood held services for the Cincinnati-Indianapolis areas on the weekly and Annual Sabbaths. Mr. George Meeker conducted weekly Sabbath services in Milwaukee. Mr. Jack Pyle held morning and afternoon services in Peoria assisted by Harold Cormany, where 250 attended from Peoria and Danville.

On Monday Morning the services opened with a sermonette by Mr. Frank McCrady on "How to Count To The Day of Pentecost." Mr. McCrady also read to us about the religious counter-part used by the world known as "Whit Sunday." God's work was blessed by an offering of over \$10,000. God commands us not to appear empty handed before Him. The main sermon for the morning was given by the District Superintendent and Evangelist of the Northern Midwest Area, Mr. Dean C. Blackwell. Mr. Blackwell opened his sermon giving us a rundown on how the Feast was kept by Paul and the disciples. But the real meat of his sermon was where the term Christian was first applied to God's Church in Antioch in 42-43 A.D., and what the church was called before this. Then Mr. Blackwell gave us guides to a personal study of tracing the history of the true church by giving us names used by the world when referring to the Church of God. Names like Nazarenes, Bogimils, Paulicians, Henrici, Arnolds, Waldenses, Lollards and Cathari have been applied to the church throughout history. He told us that groups known as the Ebionites and Albi-Gensis, although sometimes attaching themselves to God's church were never really a part of it. Mr. Blackwell also showed us in the books of Matthew and Revelation that whenever the true Church faltered, God had to take a few elect and move the church to another area. In tracing the true church, one can also trace the false church as Satan kept it close at all times to God's elect flock. This is shown in Rev. 2 and 3.

We adjourned for a delicious meal served by our deaconesses and assistants. In the afternoon services we were treated to a solo by Mrs. Richard Plache. Mr. Plache gave his second sermon of the weekend on "Using God's Spirit." He brought out that some of us if we were to honestly evaluate ourselves hadn't really grown in the last 4 or 5 years. He showed that God's Spirit is a life line between man and his creator. He ex-



plained that those with God's spirit should have a **renewing** of their minds and a definite change begins in one's character. As Christians we must walk and live in the spirit. Evaluating everything about us with the help of God's spirit. And that we, as Lot, should be vexed with the world about us. And then all too quickly it was over, and hundreds of the brethren stayed around talking and counseling and reminiscing until about 8 p.m. when the last left for home. We all yearn and long for the day when there will be no more separating, and parting of the ways for God's true elect. The day when we will be at one with Christ, forever and ever.

Meet Mr. Harold Jackson

A life story of a minister boring??? Not in the case of Mr. Jackson! His life prior to his conversion was as eventful as it was after his calling into God's Church; but the latter events were indeed more fruitful and satisfying.

It all began in 1911 in Des Moines, Iowa. At the state capitol his father was a part time clerk who boasted he would never wear overalls to make a living. Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong was born in the same city. However, he was not acquainted with the Jacksons at that time. Mr. Jackson's mother died when he was just 7 years old and for a time he lived in an orphanage until an aunt took him in.

This young man had musical talent—at the age of 3 he began playing the drums, piano at 8 years and at 14 years he added the saxaphone and clarinet. In high school he added to his ability the tuba and the string bass violin. His ability earned him the privilege to play for two summers in the Des Moines Symphony Orchestra.

His maternal grandparents worked as domestics providing the inherent cultural refinement carried through his family. This was a great asset for at the youthful age of 14 years he formed his own 16 piece band that he led on tour through the South.

Upon returning to Des Moines in 1928, he joined a semipro basketball team and toured a five state area. This team used many tricky crowd pleasing antics and were known as the "Harlem Clowns."

In 1927 Mr. Jackson married, and in subsequent years ,had two children. Rather than be a musician on the road, he earned his livelihood as a painting contractor and supplemented his income in the earlier years by playing nights and weekends with a small band "combo."

In 1932 he became an apprentice mortician. When the owner of the funeral home died he became a licensed mortician and worked nights embalming bodies. He got \$5.00 for each one and sometimes did several a night. Whatever the method he used to make a living, he always did it well.

Upon being encouraged by a Seventh Day Adventist friend, it was in 1933 that Mr. Jackson made an intensive study into the Bible about the Sabbath and the true name of God's Church.

After being baptized and keeping the Sabbath for 5 years, Mr. Jackson later moved to San Diego, California. Though he looked intensively he could not find a Sabbath-keeping Church of God in California. Years later Mrs. Jackson happened to catch the World Tomorrow Broadcast. After only hearing three boadcasts, they drove to Pasadena where they met Mr. Herbert Armstrong and received his personal tour of the college.

They were among the original church members when the San Diego Church was formed in August of 1952. He later became the first Negro Deacon, being ordained in 1957. It was November 21, 1959 that Mr. Jackson was summoned to Pasadena to be ordained as a local elder by the hands of Mr. Herbert Armstrong. It was by the fruits he bore that in April of 1963 Mr. Jackson was ordained to the rank of full preaching elder.

Mr. Jackson lives in Chicago but is expanding his itinerary to spend at least one week of each month in other Church areas. He emphasized that his job is to assist in the work among the Negro brethren serving under Mr. Dean Blackwell, Evangelist, and as racial tension mounts he concluded the urgent need is for more of the Negro brethren to serve in the ministry.




He wears a wig and nice false teeth;
