WATCH YOUR APPEARANCE

Is the way you dress and groom important in the sight of God? Probably more than you think! Jesus Christ Himself is spectacularly attired. Read the description of Christ and His attire in Rev. 1:13-15. In Matt. 22: 11-12 we read that a man was **cast out** from a wedding feast — type of Christ's marriage supper — for not being properly attired.

Recently, several in the congregation have been neglecting their physical appearance when attending Bible study and church. This is true of only a small minority — yet it is becoming a trend. Brethren, this should not be!

We are to be the light — the EX-AMPLE — of the world (Matt. 5:14-16). We certainly cannot be a very good example if we appear in our church services ill groomed and poorly dressed. This brings reproach upon God's Church and takes away from the good example set by those who have not "let down."

On the other hand, some are going to the opposite extreme.

The average American churchgoer attaches tremendous importance to his physical appearance — especially during this season of the year. Women try to out do each other in wearing gay attire and colorful bonnets. Men sport the latest in masculine dress and styling. So much importance is placed upon making a good impression on other people that church attendance, to Mr. and Mrs. America, is nothing more than another outlet for their egotism and vanity. This, also, should never be in the Church of God.

Christ rebuked the Pharisees for making broad their phylacteries emphasizing their self-importance by calling attention to their physical appearance. In I Pet. 3:3-4 God instructs us not to CALL ATTENTION to our clothing and attire.

Some women are making it a habit to always comment how well dressed "so and so" was last Sabbath. This also can be a vanity — what you really want is for someone to mention that you were very well dressed and well groomed yourself.

Brethren, let's reach a BALANCE! Let's dress well — dress to honor and please God — but not dress for the purpose of gaining the approbation of other men and women.

SERMON REVIEW Bill Seelig

On February 10, the sermon was entitled "What is the Mystery of God?" The things God is doing are hidden from the world in a mystery and are revealed to us by His Spirit. This world has a system of false mysteries, and with them, Satan is deceiving the whole world. We are told what this mystery is in Colossians 1:24 — "Christ in you, the hope of glory — ."

February 17, we heard a sermon on "The Seven Basic Traits of Character." Proverbs 6:16 gives us seven things that God hates. In contrast there are 7 traits which God likes to see in a person. We were given scriptures to show how these things, if practiced, would lead a person to real happiness.

Mr. Foster expounded on the Book of Philippians February 24. Paul knew many of the brethren might fall away because of persecution if and when he died — and there was no apostle to lead them. The whole book is an exhortation to the saints at Phillipi to remain in the faith.

"What is Worldliness?" was the title of the sermon for March 3.

We should all review our notes from time to time and take heed from the lessons they contain. Only by this can we retain what we hear!

Personal Glimpses

This month we want to introduce a couple known to one and all in the San Antonio Church of God, and to many others in the Churches of God — Mr. and Mrs. Robert V. Flores.

CHURCH OF GOD NEWS

Mr. Robert Flores was born July 20, 1925 here in San Antonio. His formal education appeared to have come to an end when he finished the sixth grade to go to work. He held various jobs until he was inducted into the Army Infantry November, 1943.

In Normandy, France, July, 7, 1944, Mr. Flores was captured by the Germans and held prisoner of war for nine and one-half months. During this time, he learned very well what it means to bear the yoke of captivity — privation, cold, hunger, hard work and enemy domination. He escaped with three other men and was soon returned to the United States where he was discharged December, 1945.

Mrs. Flores was born January 20, 1925 on the family farm near San Antonio, the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. D. Gutierrez. A prolonged illness of her mother forced her to leave school soon after completion of the sixth grade. Later, in 1942, the family moved into San Antonio and Mrs. Flores went to work at Kelly Field.

Although Mr. and Mrs. Flores had met as early as 1939, it was not until after he was in the Army that they began to "keep company" and became engaged shortly before he was sent overseas. Soon after their marriage, July 7, 1946, Mr. Flores enrolled in night school and received his high school diploma.

Mr. and Mrs. Flores began listening to Mr. Armstrong on the World Tomorrow and in December, 1951 wrote a booklet to help "clear up the Sabbath question." From a 1952 Plain Truth they learned about the Passover, and early in 1953, the whole family began observing God's Holy Days. They were charter members of the San Antonio Church. Mr. Flores was ordained a deacon in December, 1958.

Their healthy, happy children — Robert ("Bobby"), almost 14; Diana Marie, $9\frac{1}{2}$; and Harold, $4\frac{1}{2}$ — are proof that God's ways are the best ways. We should be grateful to have this warm, loving family in our midst.

Richard D. Armstrong. His capable vice-president was Mr. R. C. Meredith.

As the years passed, another necessity came to light. The number of local congregations began to increase. Many ministers and leaders began to realize that something **else** was essential. Church brethren, as a whole, needed the opportunity to develop in personality, mind, and character.

Then came the next great advance.

At Church Headquarters, in Pasadena, California — the first Spokesman Club was formed. The date was October 24, 1956. Mr. Sidney Hegvold was the first president with Mr. Keith Thomas ably assisting him as vicepresident.

There are now over NINE HUN-DRED members in the Spokesman Clubs. These members are spread out in over THIRTY separte clubs found in FIFTEEN STATES from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

But the Spokesman Clubs are MORE than a nation-wide organization. Recently a new club was begun in Sidney, Australia — with TWENTY - SIX MEMBERS.

The club in England, which has been established longer, also has twenty-six members.

SPECIAL NOTICE FROM CO-WORKER DEPARTMENT

Although the government allows you to contribute up to 30% of your income to the Church, the chances of your tax return being questioned is less when you split your contributions among two organizations. Therefore, to those of you that will be giving 20% of your income or more to the Work, we suggest that once every three or four months you request a receipt from Ambassador College. Toward the end of the year when you know your contributions are running well over 20% you might wish to classify all donations in December as Ambassador College. This simple method will insure an acceptable balance of your contributions between the Church and the College as far as the Federal Government is concerned.

Feminine Features

BUYING CITRUS FRUIT By Lois Winn

We have just recently had two severe freezes; one in Texas and one in Florida. These are two of our heaviest citrus fruit producing states.

As a result, the fruit we will be seeing on the produce shelves in our grocery stores will be more expensive and in smaller quantities. Therefore, it would pay to know some important facts about buying citrus fruit so that you will be able to give your families the most nutritious fruit for your money.

Select mature fruit. The best guides in determining the maturity of citrus fruit are color and firmness. The heavier the fruit is the jucier it will be. Therefore, avoid the light-weight. Select well-colored fruit. Do not accept that which has green areas near the stem ends.

If the fruit is too soft, it is overripe. However, if it is hard it is immature. So, look for firmness.

Skin texture is a good indicator of quality. A rough, coarse skin is quite sure to have a dry, woody and flavorless pulp, whereas the fruit having a smooth, thin skin will prove juicy and sweet.

A well formed shape indicates good quality also. Bruised fruit is not a good purchase because it will lead to early decay of that portion.

HOUSEHOLD HINT:

When using a recipe card, put the card between the tines of a fork and place the fork in a glass. The card will be held at just the right angle for reading and will be kept off the table where it might become soiled.

RECIPE:

- CASSEROLE SQUASH
- 1 lb. yellow squash
- 1 small onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup water pepper to taste
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 egg

1 large slice bread, dried and crumbled $\frac{1}{2}$ cup grated cheese

Wash the squash and cut into pieces. Cook squash and onion in salted water for about 20 minutes or until done. Remove from fire and let cool. Add egg and crumbs. Beat all ingredients with egg beater. Place in casserole and top with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes until bubbly and hot. Can be served hot or cold.

HOUSEHOLD HINT:

To reheat bread or rolls place them in a paper sack. Sprinkle the sack with water. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Turn off heat and place sack in oven for 10 minutes. With oven heat off there is no danger of paper sack catching fire.

RECIPE:

OATMEAL CHEWIES

- 2 cups Quick-cooking oats
- 1 cup brown or raw sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup cooking oil
- Mix above ingredients together and let stand for an hour.

Add and mix in:

1 egg

- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup coconut
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon vanilla dash of salt

Place by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet and bake for 12 to 15 minutes in 325 degree oven.
