The lack of space was the big problem. With Ambassador College in Pasadena already literally forced out of doors for assemblies and forums, having to lease off-campus buildings for storage, print shops and commissary department, it became evident the proportion of applicants would be even less next year.

A NEW COLLEGE is rapidly shaping up, in plans under study by many departments. Mr. Ted Armstrong, accompanied by Mr. Jack Elliott and Mr. Bob Ruxton made a fast fact-finding trip to our own tabernacle grounds a little over a month ago.

NEW OPPORTUNITY

The new college, to get underway next fall with a minimum of new facilities, is to begin with about sixty students.

It will be a full FOUR-YEAR college, a liberal arts, co-educational institution, with the SAME goals, the SAME motto, the SAME catalogue, and much of the SAME faculty!

Especially, the new college will become identical in its TONE and CHARACTER!

FIELD TRIP

After many attempts to secure permission for a guided tour through the Welder Wildlife Foundation, located about 8 miles north of Sinton, Texas, Mr. Caleb Glazener, the assistant director, arranged Sunday, September 16 as the date.

So, promptly at 1:40 P.M. September 16, Mr. Glazener unlocked the massive entrance gates to the Welder Wildlife Foundation and about fifty people were admitted.

Mr. Glazener began the tour by taking us into the Lecture Room and through the media of colored slides and by lecture, explained the purpose of the Wildlife Foundation.

After the very enjoyable lecture and pictures in natural color, we moved to the Memorial Lounge. The furnishings of the lounge looked very old, but in reality, were made about five years ago. Looking up some 30 feet, a huge circular chandelier fixture made of iron and suspended by iron chains from massive wood beams, furnished light for this huge and impressive room. We next toured the museum, where Mr. Glazener handed out to each person a folder with a picture of Mr. Welder, the founder, and his life history.

The climax came when we toured, by car, approximately ten miles of native surroundings to see the wild animals and birds in their natural settings and habitat. We saw a great many deer grazing in peace, some of them hardly raised their heads to look at us as we drove by. We also saw quite a few wild turkeys feeding alongside the road; they also, did not run or fly.

This was: in a way, a preview of the peaceful times soon to come and be established here on earth — The World Tomorrow!

Two sweet and pleasant sisters in the San Antonio Church are Mrs. Alva Marshall and Mrs. Sadie Carroll. They were both born into a large family in Gonzales, Texas; Mrs. Marshall on July 3, 1893 and Mrs. Carroll on November 25, 1901. Their grandmother had been such a well-known cook in that area, that even her granddaughters were sought after to become cooks. Mrs. Marshall went to work as a cook after she finished the 8th grade, but

Mrs. Carroll graduated from high school before becoming Second Cook in a local hotel.

While visiting in San Antonio in the early Thirties, Mrs. Marshall met Mr. Ferdinand Marshall who lived across the street from her aunt. She noted that he was kind to his wife and children and a good neighbor to her aunt. Later, after the death of his wife, he and Mrs. Marshall began going together and were married in June, 1940 until his death in 1958. Mrs. Marshall has one son, who lives in California. Her interests are gardening, sewing, housekeeping, reading and cooking.

Mrs. Carroll married a former schoolmate, Mr. Moses Carroll, and they had a daughter in 1924. Later, the family moved to San Antonio where they lived with an uncle. Mr. Carroll fell ill in 1947 and died in 1949. Her daughter married in 1955, and Mrs. Carroll moved in with Mrs. Marshall. She is working now as a housekeeper, and when time permits, she enjoys sewing and reading.

Mrs. Carroll first heard of Mr. Armstrong one Sunday evening in 1946 and enthusiastically recommended the program to Mrs. Marshall.
